



AIRBORN ART POLICY

If you plan to operate any **personal aircraft** (ultralight, power-glider, paraglider, etc) at Element-11, you are expected to adhere to the following practices:

- Check in with Ranger Shift Command or with the Medical Lead before taking flight. They must clear you for takeoff.
- You must be in communication with Ranger Shift Command or Medical Dispatch during your flight. Check with them to find out what radio frequencies they are operating on if you have your own radio.
 - If you do not have your own radio, one may be available for you to borrow, but this is dependant on resources. It is recommended you get your own UHF/VHF Radio.
- In the event of a medical emergency, an evacuation helicopter will most likely be dispatched from an area hospital. They will be unable to land if there is anything occupying our airspace. It is therefore crucial that the Rangers or Medical volunteers be able to recall you quickly. If you see or hear a helicopter, you must land as quickly as you can without endangering yourself or others.

If you plan to operate any **remote-control, autonomous, semi-autonomous, or fly-by-wire unmanned aerial craft**, you must follow the following practices:

- If your device has the capacity for a continuous flight time of more than **10 minutes**, you must check in with Ranger Shift Command or the Medical Lead before launching it. They may ask you to operate your device from a particular area, or they may just need to know how they can reach you in case it becomes necessary to clear our airspace for an emergency helicopter to approach and land.
- If your device is capable of recording images, remember that the same standards of ethics and consent apply to remote aerial photography as to any other type. If you are using your camera in a non-consensual manner, you may be removed from the event.

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
